# FIRST BLACK ACPHS GRADUATE: JAMES GARDNER

James Gardner was born in Albany, NY, in 1864 to William and his wife Elizabeth Gardiner. James' father was a barber and very active in fighting for the equal rights of Black Americans. He was a member of the Black Republicans after the war and part of the group of men that influenced the school board to desegregate the schools of Albany in the early 1870s. He also attended several New York State Colored Conventions. By the 1850s, he became the vice president of the Albany Vigilance Committee, where he financed Albany's Underground Railroad, which helped fugitive slaves escape from the South. Elizabeth was a member of the Female Lundy Society, a charitable organization formed in the 1830s by the Black women in Albany that survived until at least the early 1900s. Their family lived on Second Street in Arbor Hill for several decades.

James graduated vice president of his class in 1888. Gardner wrote his graduation thesis about "Percolation" where he won \$20 for best thesis. He got married that same year to Caroline Deyo. After graduation, James and his wife lived in the 11th ward in Albany per the 1892 Census. Additionally in the Census he was listed with a "b" signifying he was Black, and his profession was labeled as "Druggist."

Gardner worked for the drugstore owned by Clement & Rice at the corner of State and Eagle Streets, as well as for Thomas Pennington at his drugstore in Saratoga Springs, being the only Black druggist in the city at that time.

Our DEI Office met with Albany Law colleagues back in December and we are excited to announce that there will now be collaboration between these offices.



# 19TH ANNUAL AFRICANA FILM FESTIVAL


On the 6th, 13th, and 20th of February, beginning at 7:00 PM in SC201, ACPHS will host the 19th year of its annual Africana Film Series. This year's theme is: Independence and Justice - Africa and Its Diaspora. These events will be hosted by Kevin Hickey, Associate Professor of Africana Studies.

Feb 6th: The first film, Twist à Bamako (Dancing the Twist in Bamako), is a colorful, invigorating, multi-layered film that looks at the complex currents flowing through the country of Mali soon after its 1960 independence from France.

Feb 13th: The second film, *Un Fils (A Son)*, is a tense, emotionally complex film that also takes place in the aftermath of a political revolution: the summer after the 2011 Tunisian Uprising (aka the Jasmine Revolution) that ignited the Arab Spring.

The third and final film for 2024, Marighella, is about the Afro-Brazilian poet, politician, and (depending on whom you ask) freedom fighter or terrorist Carlos Marighella.

All three films look at aspirations to make the world a better place. Food and drinks will be provided at these events.
