Women's Spotlight: Sheila Lelei

Sheila Lelei graduated in May 2023 and started her fellowship originally in June with Seagen – a midsize biotech company in the Pacific Northwest that focuses on oncology - and was acquired by Pfizer in December. "Seagen has an excellent culture and she has such a supportive team that saw the valuable traits that every single person had to offer," Lelei said when asked about her work experience so far. She decided to go into the oncology field because it affects so many people and it is meaningful to her to "make sure that people are able to get the medications for that disease state that has a very unfortunate outcome if not treated." Lelei works for a breast cancer medication and the San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium Conference was her first big project. She was asked to develop all the assets such as digital touch screens, the LED video wall, decals, brandings, etc. She claims that this has been one of the highlights of her career so far.



Despite the fact that she has not been in the industry too long, one thing she has noticed is a lack of representation. "When I go to different meetings, conferences, or events it's rare or to see people that look like me," Lelei said when

asked about her experience as a Black woman in the pharmaceutical industry. Now she is learning how to navigate this and how to exist within those spaces. When asked about the struggles she has had to overcome as a woman in the pharmaceutical industry, nothing came to her mind.

"It's recognizing how women and men can do the exact same thing. Just because we're women it doesn't mean that we can't achieve



certain positions, that we're not as qualified, that we're not as strong, that we're not as able to do things that historically people thought that women couldn't do," Lelei said when asked about what Women's History Month means to her. Her mom is one of the many women she looks up to because she has always championed women doing anything that men can do. Her mother grew up in Kenya where at the time there was a difference in privileges between a boy vs girl child. For example, going to different schools or getting the privileges to go out vs stay at home. One of the many tips she gives to all women is to "Be proactive – you have to make life happen for yourself and not necessarily wait for other people to give you the opportunities or to pull you up to certain places." She says this to encourage women who may be discouraged from making their dreams come true.

She liked that ACPHS afforded her an opportunity to be seen on campus. She feels that she knew a lot of people from various departments and her classmates, which allowed her to get involved in a lot of clubs and take on a leadership position to be able to have a really close-knit community. She really enjoyed her experience at ACPHS and believes attending ACPHS took her a lot farther than she probably would have if she had gone to a larger school where she would have slipped into the background. She was a resident assistant from her second year to her fifth year, a member of iPhO and director of professional development for two years, president and president-elect of AMCP, a member of ASHP, a member of APhA, and a member of BSU. First ACPHS Women's Graduate: Sarah E. Simonet



Sarah E. Simonet, the first woman graduate of ACPHS, was born on July 25th, 1854 in Schoharie County, NY. She was the daughter of Irish immigrants and lived in Croghan, NY, a tiny town at the western edge of the Adirondacks. Simonet lived in Croghan for 12 years before she studied pharmacology in Albany and medicine in Buffalo. She married Augustine Simonet in November of 1871 when she was 16 or 17 and over the next six years, they had four children together.

Simonet enrolled at ACPHS when she was 26 years old and graduated from ACPHS in 1883 in a class of 21 students – 20 men and one woman. At this time, the pharmacy program was just two years old. She and her husband owned a general



store, and not long after Sarah's graduation, they added a pharmacy. Two years later she went on to graduate from the University of Buffalo as a physician. Simonet went on to open offices in Croghan and Utica and was held in high esteem by Croghan which now has a historical marker that stands in her honor. She combined the practice of pharmacy with the practice of medicine and was completely dedicated to caring for a medically underserved population.
